In the place where I live

In the place where I live, we have a group of people who are bullies. They show up to meetings together, seeming to enjoy safety in numbers. They complain about what is happening in the community but refuse to help. When asked to help, they say they are "too busy" or they are "going away".

In the place where I live, there is no room for disagreement or differing opinions. When the bullies attend meetings together, they are openly hostile. They don't listen, they don't compromise. They don't hesitate to say what's on their mind about any subject or person. They might not name a person, but everyone at the meeting knows who they are talking about. They are mean spirited and don't mind hurting other people's feelings. They often intimidate people who are not part of their support group into silence.

In the place where I live, the bullies, as a group seem to like certain people and despise others. Often the victims of their ill will don't know why this group feels this way about them and no one in the group will speak directly to that person about their grievance. They just natter about it among themselves and do their best to make life miserable for their targets.

In the place where I live, there are good people. In the beginning, when the good people attend meeting, they are shocked at the bullies' behavior. After experiencing the bullies' behavior a time or two, the good people learn to keep their heads down, hide away and isolate themselves. They don't attend meetings. They don't volunteer. They are afraid of the backlash just because they hold an opinion that's different than the loudest voices.

So, in the place where I live, little gets accomplished. Little ever changes.
