Edgewood Flashbacks



As November approaches, my thoughts return to the Edgewood cenotaph that was built by my Great Grandfather.

By 1912, John Neil Mcleod had been here for a couple of years, constructed many buildings in Edgewood and fallen in love with the town. He built a house for his family, moving his wife Agnes and children, from Nelson. It was in this house that the first telephone switchboard was installed, being operated by Agnes and later, my Grandmother Belle. He also built St. Agnes church. In May 1920, shortly after returning from World War One, he built the cenotaph, enclosing a 'time capsule' of a local newspaper of the day and coins obtained from the war in Europe. Mr. Mcleod and his partner, Mr. Dority, opened Edgewood Cash Grocery around the same time. He gradually gave up his building contracting business and added gas pumps to his former office property, the 'Home Service Station' where he sold gas and supplied auto parts. His neighbour serviced vehicles at 'Forsland's Garage'. Mr. Mcleod bought out his partner Mr. Dority in the early thirties. He and his son, Jack (Jackie) operated the businesses until John McLeod's passing in 1948. Jack continued on until Edgewood was flooded. The cenotaph was moved, stone by stone and reconstructed on it's present site prior to the flood.
