Here are 6 interesting facts to know about July

- 1. Canada will be 150 years old on July 1st 2020.
- 2. July is named after Roman dictator Julius Caesar (100 B.C.–44 B.C.). With the help of Sosigenes, Caesar developed the precursor to the Gregorian calendar we use today. On April 6th, 1896 the first modern time Olympics were held in Athens, Greece after a break of 1,500 years.
- 3. It is sometimes called the Hay month because the grass dries out due to a lack of rain and can be made into hay.
- 4. July's birthstone, the ruby, is often associated with contentment, love, passion, and integrity.
- 5. On 1 July 1867, the British government (under Queen Victoria) approved a plan which allowed Canada to become an independent country with its own government. Four provinces (Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick) joined to form the Dominion of Canada.
- 6. Sometimes the hot, long days of July are called the "dog days of summer".
