



## COVID RESTART PLAN

To get back to life before COVID-19, the government has implemented a 4-step plan. This plan is put in place to make sure that numbers will not spike rapidly again.

The **first step** of the restart plan has been completed. This included lifting the travel ban within the province. Recreational travel within BC is now permitted, however out-of-province non-essential travel advisory continues.

**Step 2:** To be implemented on June 15<sup>th</sup>.

- This second step in the plan will allow for outdoor social gatherings of up to 50 people
- BC Transit and BC Ferries offers increased services.
- Small in-person meetings allowed.

**Step 3:** Earliest date to start phase is July 1<sup>st</sup>. For BC to move onto this next step, at least 70% of 18+ population to be vaccinated with dose 1 and declining hospitalization numbers.

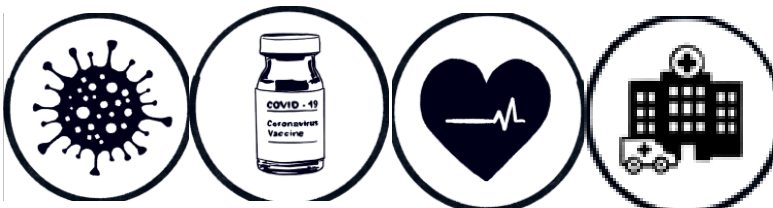
- Return to usual indoor and outdoor gatherings for both personal and organized gatherings
- Canada wide recreational travel

**Step 4:** Earliest start date is September 7<sup>th</sup>. For BC to move onto this next step, more than 70% of 18+ population to be vaccinated with dose 1 and declining hospitalization numbers.

- Return to normal.
- Workplaces, organized and personal gatherings, sports and exercise all returned to normal.
