January has been an exciting month so far at *The Edge*. The regional workshop at the Whatshan Lake Retreat went very well and we had many people attend and gave some wonderful presentations. The goals and objectives of the workshop were to provide opportunities to explore effective technology applications in learning and community capacity building, to explore innovation and sustainability strategies for rural BC communities and to examine issues of access to technology for groups such as rural communities and youth in order to expand the network of communities using technology for citizen and community development. The contributed presentations covered many different aspects such as: digital telescopes, an address from Bev Collins of the PCNA, Blair Suffredine, MLA, Matt Wenger from the Provincial Digital Divide Project, Bryan Oulton of the Neil Squire Foundation, Brandon Hughes Canadian Rural Partnerships, Doug Switzer from CBT, Terri McLeod from Nakusp Outreach, Perry Jones from Canada's Digital Collections and Kristen Koppang and Jennifer Wilkie from Smart Choices. A major highlight of the workshop was the insightful and stimulating open discussion of the merging of the Columbia Power Corporation and Columbia Basin Trust. In Blair Suffredine's address he talked about ending the digital divide and how it was an important component in the new era document. He stated that it was the government's intention to get high speed internet access to broadband to all provincial communities including Edgewood. Participants agreed that it was a lively and fruitful agenda and thought that it was something that should happen again. The workshop group was drawn from a wide range of professions within the Community Access Program and many did not know each other before the meeting except through the internet. The KootenArrow Networks is made up of fifty CAP Sites and this workshop was an opportunity for representatives from these sites to do some real face to face networking. The workshop was a great success from the perspective of all who attended.
