CAP YI Returns!

With the return of summer, the KootenArrow Network is proud to announce the return of the CAP Youth Intern Program. This program is meant to provide assistance to CAP sites in delivering services, while giving youths an opportunity to gain work experience and hone tech-oriented skills. Our Network has received 7 positions this year, a reduction from last year based on cutbacks in the program as a whole, and as a result most of the positions have been split between two CAP sites.

At present, they are spread among the sites in Edgewood, Faquier, Kimberly, Creston, Castlegar, Salmo, Radium, Invermere, and Lardeau Valley (Meadow Creek). The Regional Coordinator is Perry Jones, from Edgewood, and the Provincial Coordinator, Tate Bengtson, is in Lumby.
